

#### **Young Enterprise**

Two companies and a record 24 members of the Lower Sixth took on the Young Enterprise challenge this year. 'Alpha' and 'Bulldog' sold shares to investors, elected functional directors and held weekly board meetings, very much in the same way that a real business might run. Bethany also hosted the main YE company competition for the Ashford area, as well as an Entrepreneurship Masterclass in the summer.



Bulldog's main product was colour coded wristbands. They also ran a silent auction in the summer term and gave half of the proceeds from this, £91, to Kent Air Ambulance and also paid a 20% dividend to shareholders. They competed with great enthusiasm in the March company competition and certainly put on a very memorable presentation. The main lesson they learnt from the scheme was that if not all the team are willing to contribute, not only does this affect the work that those members were supposed to do, but it also affects the other members' morale. Ed Nash, who took over as Managing Director of Bulldog in the Spring Term commented, "Although we were disheartened when some members of the company decided to leave, this did give us the opportunity to organise ourselves more effectively. The Scheme has taught us a good deal about business life and its ups and downs, but the most important lesson learned was that of being committed to something". Bulldog certainly moved on from the challenges it faced and finished the scheme strongly.

Alpha had a range of products including Christmas gifts, Valentine's roses and Bethany engraved silverware. They also hosted a "Rage in the Cage" football tournament and sold signed memorabilia on Speech Day, which was particularly successful. They were able to pay themselves healthy wages, their shareholders a 50% dividend, and made a donation to charity. Everyone present will remember their presentation at the company competition, particularly Sam and Winston's entrance and many present felt the company was extremely unlucky not to win overall. Alpha's Managing Director, Sam Elobeid said, "We came up with the slogan "The first in business", however, we soon came to realise that there is a huge gap between planning something and actually carrying it out. We also learnt about the importance of being adaptable as not everything goes according to plan. Overall we had a great year. Yes, we made mistakes but we learnt from them and improved and we were very proud at being able to support the "Rainbow Kidz" charity."





#### Young Enterprise Public Speaking

He spoke superbly about housing in the South East, winning against strong opposition. He then went on to the County final in Maidstone, where he was pipped at the post. However, it was a great experience for Sam that will no doubt come in useful in the future.

#### Entrepreneurship Masterclass



Late in the summer term all Lower Sixth pupils took part in an "Entrepreneurship Masterclass" event, run by Young Enterprise and hosted at Bethany. Two visiting schools also participated. Guest speakers included Marc Lemezma, a business psychologist and professional magician, Simon Loveridge, a local entrepreneur who has set up many businesses and invested in many more, and Graham Webb MBE, a Kent Ambassador and international entrepreneur. There were also a series of workshops and the day was enjoyed by all who attended.

### Pengelly Society Report

The Society began on a high note this year with the return visit of local historian Mr. Bill Ogley. Using his most recent book as a starting point, Mr. Ogley spoke to a full house about the twentieth century history of Kent.

There was a great deal of interest. For example, with many members of the Society in the process of starting to drive, it was interesting to learn of the history of the automobile in the county. Evidently in 1894 there was only one car owner in Kent and that was the mayor of Tunbridge Wells. How things have changed!

Mr. Ogley also spoke of the many well-known people who have close associations with the county. He mentioned authors such as Edith Nesbitt who wrote "The Railway Children", sportsmen such as Malcolm Campbell and, more recently, Mick Jagger who used to sell ice creams outside Dartford Library.



Mr. Lennox Cato is the Chairman of the British Antique Dealers' Association. When he spoke to the Society he did more than just explain the basics of the antiques world. He also brought with him various objects. These included tea chests, an unusual plate bucket and a matching set of tables and chairs all of which were exquisitely crafted. This meeting was followed by an exceptionally lengthy question and answer session during which it became clear that the audience had been as much impressed by Mr. Cato's entrepreneurial skills as they had by his knowledge of valuable items of furniture.

Mr. John Hare was the Society's next speaker on the 11th October. Supported by captivating images, Mr. Hare described the plight of the wild Bactrian Camel. This is the double-humped camel that is able to survive in the salty conditions of the Gobi Desert. It is now critically endangered and Mr. Hare is a founder member of the Wild Camel Protection Foundation which is dedicated to conserving these creatures of the Chinese wilderness.

The 220th meeting of the Society saw another return visit; that of Mr. Mike Trueman, an experienced mountaineer, who has led several expeditions in the Himalayas and to Mount Everest. It was felt that his presentation would be particularly inspiring to many of the seasoned Duke of Edinburgh candidates in the audience as well as fascinating everyone present with his breath-taking images of the so-called "Death Zone" through which climbers must pass to reach the summit of Everest.





The 222nd meeting took place on 24th April and the guest speaker was Mr. Tom Hart Dyke, designer and caretaker of "The World Garden" at Luddingstone Castle. Mr. Hart Dyke's talk focussed on his passion for all things floral – particularly the orchid. For many this had appeal. However, his account of being kidnapped by anti-government rebels whilst he was journeying through the Darian Gap in Panama intrigued everybody present and brought to an end another very successful year in the Society's 37 year history.

# How has the new Labour Government started?

As Gordon Brown and his cabinet look back over the last 246 days in power since 27th June 2007, they might feel they have endured a series of unfortunate events and sense the days of support for the new Labour government appear to be numbered.

However before we examine these illfated affairs we shall observe Gordon Brown's political history. From 1997 to 2007 he served as Chancellor of the Exchequer under Tony Blair and was largely credited for his work in this position as he obtained three major achievements within this post. Firstly, the UK recorded its longest period of economic growth, the Bank of England became independent and Gordon Brown delivered on an agreement for poverty and climate change in the G8 summit of 2005. In addition to these achievements he became the longest serving chancellor since Nicholas Vonsittort in the early 19th century. With these political credentials achieved through his position as Chancellor, the public viewed Gordon Brown as a competent, safe and dependable individual, an ideal candidate if he were to become Prime Minister. Therefore, when the Labour Party looked for a new leader when Tony Blair announced he would be stepping down from his position as Prime Minister, Gordon Brown was voted in by the majority of the party members to replace him.

When Gordon Brown took the position as Prime Minister on 27th June 2007 with a new cabinet they began well and dealt with the arising issues of the summer floods, terrorism and foot and mouth effectively and this new government's image was positive. The British public's perception of Gordon Brown was of a man in control, directing operations and showing strong leadership. This constituted the honeymoon period when any Prime Minister comes to power. This quickly dissipated with the somewhat clumsy way Alastair Darling (Chancellor of the Exchequer) tried to emulate his predecessor's achievements. This began with the capital gains tax new proposals in the pre budget report in October 2007.

This was received with fierce criticism by the majority of the business sector in the UK as many small businesses and entrepreneurs would be affected. However the government went back on this and devised a new plan. Darling in his first proposal was attempting to clamp down on big city bonuses, however he was viewed as politically clumsy as he had not thought of the entire consequences on other individuals within the business sector in the UK. In addition Darling further angered the business sector with his proposals of the non-domicile tax, where foreign people who worked in the UK, but haven't declared their earnings would be taxed £30,000 unless they declared their earnings to the government. This proposal received much criticism as it was argued this would give foreign people no incentive to stay within the UK.

The largest issue this new Labour government have had to deal with though has been the Northern Rock crisis. This occurred when the bank found existing lines of credit had disappeared after the collapse of the US sub prime market and banks became nervous to lend to one another. Therefore the markets seized up and the bank found it difficult to borrow. This term is referred to as liquidity. This led to Northern Rock applying for a loan from the Bank if England and this was accepted by Alistair Darling. This loan was important as it allowed Northern Rock to continue trading and the UK banking system to be stable. However when news of Northern Rock's financial problems reached the public, up to £4 billion was withdrawn in savings as there was fear the bank could go into administration. Consequently, the government assured people who had money in the bank that it would be safe as they would underwrite the assets of the bank. Alastair Darling then announced that the government would review options open for the bank such as selling the bank to private organisations or nationalisation. The government decided the bank would be nationalised for a temporary period to ensure the bank's long term stability. The bank would eventually be sold when "market conditions improve" This was described by Robert Peston, BBC business editor as the "biggest decision made yet by the Prime Minister". The government received criticism and praise with their dealings in this process. They received

criticism for "dithering" too long on many key decisions, but received praise for acting in a controlled and authoritative manner with the bank's crisis.

The new Labour government also received many embarrassing blunders in government departments such as the loss of child benefit data. In this case two discs which held personal details of all the families in the UK with children under 16 "vanished". Overall 25 million people were affected and 7.25 million families. The Conservative Party referred to this as a "catastrophic" failure. In addition this loss of data undermined the government's intention to launch national identity cards, as this loss of data undermined the system they had in place to store data.

There was also much embarrassment surrounding the proposed Autumn elections by the UK media. With the success of the way the government had dealt with foot and mouth, the summer floods, terrorism and so forth, the media believed he was in a position to call autumn elections until he ruled this out on 6th October 2007. This was viewed as an embarrassment for Brown by many as he appeared to be about to call one but public opinion turned against him for dithering and many felt he lost his nerve, which damaged his public image.

In conclusion I personally believe the new Labour government headed by Gordon Brown has been successful to a certain extent with issues such as foot and mouth, terrorism and summer floods. However several key figures within the Cabinet including Peter Haine and Alastair Darling have strived to damage this government's perceived competence. In addition Gordon Brown's public image does not benefit the Labour Party as he is often viewed as a poor communicator as well as his presentational skills being wooden and un-energetic. One such example of this was demonstrated in an interview by Ed Stourton in the "Today Programme" on Radio 4, when he asked Gordon Brown, "Are you enjoying it?" with the verbose response being "I am well aware of all the difficult issues and trying to make the best of it". This illustrates poor political narrative when he could have so simply replied "Yes". Brown's poor presentational skills and seeming inability to connect with the issues of the day, stand in stark contrast with those of his predecessor, and may yet be his Achilles' heel in the next general election.

Pupils who were learning a musical instrument spent a fruitful afternoon with Mr. Keeping learning the theme from the blockbuster film, "Mission Impossible".

Year 8 then had an afternoon learning about the chromatic scale. 'James Bond', 'Jaws' and 'The Phantom of the Opera' were on the musical menu. All of the pupils managed to play one or all of these themes with considerable skill.

Instead of a curriculum afternoon, Year 7's were treated to a trip to the Barbican to hear the London Symphony Orchestra. Prior to the





trip, they had been learning about the instruments of the orchestra as well as learning a catchy song for the occasion. Seeing and hearing a large modern symphony orchestra play some great tunes really inspired many of the pupils.

At GCSE and AS/A2, there have been some outstanding compositions produced by pupils as part of their coursework.

#### **Major Termly Concert**

There have been concerts at the end of each term at which all of the Department's major ensembles have performed. The Symphony Orchestra has continued to go from strength to strength. I am grateful to Mr. Briggs in helping to make this flagship ensemble so successful. In September, he will take over the role of conducting this ensemble. The Orchestra has performed a wide range of pieces from the 1980's hit TV programmes 'Cagney and Lacey' and 'Dynasty' to Holst's 'Jupiter'.

Other instrumental/vocal groups which have given some outstanding performances at these concerts include: Concert Band, Brass Consort, Woodwind Ensemble, Mr. Fisher's band 'The Lizards' and the Choir.

Perhaps the highlight of the year for many of us was the second highly successful Summer Proms Concert. The Upper Dining Room was suitably dressed in red, white and blue balloons and bunting for this fun occasion. The audience were fantastic, singing all the patriotic songs with great gusto and enthusiasm. Flag waving and shouts of 'encore' helped to capture and recreate the atmosphere of the similar occasion enjoyed by millions of BBC viewers in September every year.





#### Informal/Lunchtime Concerts

These concerts have enabled budding soloists to perform in a sympathetic and supportive environment. A number of special Informal Concerts have taken place in the intimate surroundings of the Chapel. This has been a perfect venue for a light-hearted and relaxed evening of music-making. It has been encouraging to hear beginners play alongside post-Grade 8 performers. The standard of performance has been consistently high throughout each of the evenings. Bethany's violin teacher, Miss Victoria, gave an outstanding lunchtime recital this year, which included Paganini's celebrated 'Variations for Violin'.

#### **Church Services**

There have been some very special Church services at both Cranbrook and Marden parish churches this year.

At the Remembrance Day service in Marden the Choir sang a setting of some famous words associated with this solemn occasion, "We will remember them". The service opened with Miss Victoria playing the haunting theme from the film, 'Schindler's List'.

The Christmas Carol Service at Cranbrook was another great occasion at which many of our musicians performed. The Brass Consort unleashed their full power during the big congregational carols, commencing 'Hark, the Herald' and 'O Come, All Ye Faithful' with powerful fanfares. A vocal trio gave a moving and uplifting performance of the classic carol 'Silent Night'. The Choir gave an

outstanding and spirited performance of the classic carol 'Angel Tidings'.

The Easter Service returned to Marden for another memorable service. One of the musical highlights of the service was Rebecca Knight singing a song about Jesus' death and resurrection, 'The Power of the Cross'. The Choir sang a lively vocal piece, which captured the excitement and energy of the first Easter morning.

#### **Assemblies**

Each week, soloists have continued to start each of Headmaster's weekly assemblies. We have been treated to a wide variety of instruments as well as different styles of music. I always admire pupils who play at this event. Playing in front of 400+ pupils with 40 members of staff behind you can be very nerve-racking.

#### Scholars' Presentation Evening

In March, all of our music scholars performed a solo on their principal instrument. These music scholars have made a significant contribution to the wider musical life of the School and have hopefully inspired other musicians to aim for excellence within the performing arena.

#### Speech Day

One of the most daring ventures of the year was to get the Brass Consort to play the opening fanfares at Speech Day in the vast acoustic of the Sports Hall. Thanks to Mr. Fisher, the portable organ was fed through the main public address system at full power. I felt like I was playing the magnificent organ at St. Paul's Cathedral. The echo was, I would venture, even longer than this great building in central London! The Brass Consort and Organ sounded magnificent, stirring and suitably rousing.

#### **Closing Remarks**

There is never a quiet week in the Music Department! There is always at least one occasion or event which requires preparation and rehearsal. Within the Department there is a real sense of energy and purpose, but also camaraderie and fun. Bethany should feel very proud of the visiting instrumental teachers who do a magnificent job at nurturing and developing the musical talent in many of our pupils.

I would also like to thank the many staff who have supported musical events, through providing refreshments, performing in ensembles, supporting in the audience or arranging flowers for concert venues.

As I leave Bethany School and 'hang up' my baton, so to speak, I feel deeply honoured to have led the Music Department over the last four or so years. They have been exciting, exhilarating and rewarding times. Underpinning these years has been a strong desire on my part to ensure that all of the pupils come to love, respect and enjoy music making. The MGM film 'Mr. Holland's Opus' has always been an inspiration to me. In the film Glenn Holland, the central character, states, quite rightly, that "playing music is supposed to be fun... It's about heart, it's about feelings, it's about moving people, and it's not about notes on a page." I hope the pupils whom I have taught have captured this vision of what Music is really all about in recent times.

### Drama and Theatre Studies



The Autumn Term began as usual with the auditions and rehearsals for the annual school production but this year things were a little different. We had decided to write and create our own musical based on the history of the School. Mr Cullen, one of our English teachers, volunteered to write the basic story which was then edited by the students and myself. The musical element was developed by Mr Fisher, Mr Briggs and the Lizards, the School's R&B band. Students, staff and parents worked very hard over the four month period to rehearse and prepare for the final performances. Yet again over 60 students were involved and it was great to see many more helping with the design, sound, lighting, back stage management and set design.

The opening night was a very special gala evening attended by many Old Bethanians as well as by some members of the Kendon family, descendents of The Reverend Joseph Kendon, the School's founder. The performers certainly did justice to the very personal story and I would like to commend them for the progress they made and the final product. We enjoyed four sell-out performances and overall the show was an astounding success and a fantastic tribute to the success of Joseph Kendon's school in the twenty-first century. The principals were

of the highest quality and it was great to see new talent displayed with such eloquence, including Lydia Homewood, who in her first year at Bethany, rose to the challenge of a lead role. Our older and more experienced students again gave convincing and highly entertaining performances and Edward Nash, Oliver Hindle and Harriet Proud received praise and compliments in the form of many thank you letters and emails from audience members. The great thing about this project was that all those involved were able to have a role as we developed and adapted the script to suit us as we went along and the younger pupils displayed a wealth of emerging talent. As always I am incredibly proud of the achievements made in this production and of all those involved.



In the later part of the Autumn Term the A2 students performed their devised theatre piece to a live audience in the Drama Studio. This was based on the topic of 'Old Age' and aimed to portray the prejudices associated with old age and to question these ideas and opinions.

They had worked hard all term to develop and shape their ideas as a group and the final physical theatre piece was extremely moving and powerful, leaving the audience thinking about their own family and their treatment of the elderly.

When we returned after the well earned Christmas holiday the focus turned to the GCSE group and their preparation for the Paper Two performance exams. There is added pressure in this part of the course as a visiting examiner is present for all performances as well as family and friends. The group of 11 students performed two pieces; 'Journey's End', a classic naturalistic play based on life in the trenches during the First World War and the effects of war on the officers, and 'The Exam' a non-naturalistic piece that looks at three Year 11 pupils as they sit a GCSE exam and the pressures they face.



Both groups were very nervous but they had no need to be as I am sure that all those present would agree the work presented was first class and their final results reflected this with four pupils achieving 40/40, one of whom, Sebastian Bignell, we were later thrilled to learn scored 100% in the overall examination. He was in the top ten out of just under 70,000 candidates, a tremendous achievement!

Over the Easter holidays there was a Drama department first as 17 Theatre Studies' students and three staff members jetted off to New York for a fantastic four days of theatre workshops, Broadway shows, theatre tours, ice skating, sight seeing and of course shopping! There is no doubt that the trip was a resounding success. The students really enjoyed all the activities and excelled in the workshops, so much so that they were highly commended by one of the workshop leaders, a professional Broadway director. The success of the tour was largely due to the impeccable behaviour and sense of humour displayed by the students and of course the hard work of the staff who accompanied them. Many thanks to you all.



Shortly after the excitement of the GCSE work and the New York trip, the AS and A2 groups were in action again performing their Unit Two and Unit Five pieces. The large group of 12 AS pupils were directed by me in two contemporary political plays by Edward Bond, 'Great Peace' and 'Tin Can People', about nuclear war and the effects of this conflict on human behaviour. On the same evening the A2 students performed their self-directed version of the Bertolt Brecht classic 'The Caucasian Chalk Circle'. This was examined with one student offering lighting design as his skill The plays chosen were particularly challenging and the contrasting topics and staging styles made for another diverse and highly professional


evening of Drama.

The results for this cohort were very pleasing with 100% pass rate and some very impressive marks for the practical components.

As the exam season drew to a close we began preparing for the Lower School Production of 'Sheherazade', an adaptation of tales from the Arabian nights. The show was the most challenging yet, with so many different parts and many students had to multi-role play which presented several challenges. The set and the costumes looked fantastic and thanks to the staff who helped out. The students certainly had great fun in the belly dancing outfits and turbans! Sixth formers played a large part in this performance taking control of many of the technical aspects of the show and back stage management. The two performances were very successful and all those involved should be very proud of their achievements.

As all of the above goes on throughout the year students' input and experiences have been enhanced by theatre visits. In total this year the Drama department has organised eight theatre visits. Some of these include the amazing 'Masque of the Red Death' which was set in the Battersea Arts Centre over five floors. Audience members followed the actors around the space and chose what they wanted to watch. The Year 13 students and I really enjoyed this experience and were left excited and ready to get back to the Drama studio and adapt some of their ideas! Another highlight was the Years 10 & 11 visit to 'The History Boys.'





The show is fantastic and I think everyone thoroughly enjoyed the experience and learnt a lot from it.

Once again this year two of our students took part in nationwide auditions for the National Youth Music Theatre and were successful. They took part in a musical adaptation of 'Great Expectations' performed at Bracknell Southill Arts Centre. John Cockcroft, one of our Drama scholars, was also selected to become a member of the National Youth Theatre which is a tremendous achievement as the audition process is very rigorous. This will be a fantastic opportunity for John, although he will have to wait until 2009 to begin training with them.

Yet again this year has been full of success stories and excellent achievements and as the Drama Department continues to grow so does the students' commitment and enthusiasm for the performing arts in general. As I look forward to next year and start planning for 'Guys and Dolls' and the various exam performances, I think we can expect even greater achievements and many more entertaining evenings. Thank you to all those students, staff and parents who continue to support the Drama Department.







### Staff Moves 2008

#### John Small



John Small's retirement on 31st March 2008 marked the end of the Small dynasty which had existed at Bethany for over 50 years,

over 50 years, including John, his father and his wife, Sue. John worked in the Maintenance Department for no less than 46 years and after many years as Maintenance Foreman, John was the School Caretaker for the last eight years of his long and loyal service to the School

In the early 1960's John's father was running the School's maintenance team when the carpenter died suddenly, leaving the team very short staffed. John's knowledge of the school facilities was encyclopaedic. He knew exactly where every underground pipe or cable ran, or which fuse box served which socket and this knowledge is sorely missed today. John had a wonderful gift of remaining calm and unflappable whatever the crisis that was facing him and this, coupled with his dry sense of humour, made him a popular and respected colleague and foreman.

John saw many changes at Bethany over the years and his contribution to all the developments was considerable, although frequently this was behind the scenes and therefore not recognised. With the final retirement of the Small's, Bethany has lost a family of very loyal friends to whom the community owes a great deal.

John and Sue have now moved to the Hastings area to be close to Sue's parents and we all wish them both a long and happy retirement and many more happy holidays touring in their motor home.



## What do you know about DofE?

Bethany is one of a select number of schools in the south east of England that is licensed to operate the Award Scheme independently.

There are three levels of programme which, when successfully completed lead to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award. The main differences between the levels are the minimum length of time it takes to complete them, how challenging it is and the minimum age you can start.

An Award is achieved by completing a personal programme of activities in four sections (five if going for Gold).

#### These sections are:

- Volunteering undertaking a service to individuals or the community
- Physical becoming fitter through sport, dance or fitness activities
- Skills developing existing talents or trying something new
- Expedition planning, training for and completing an adventurous journey in the UK or abroad
- Residential Gold programme participants must also complete an additional fifth Residential section which involves staying and working away from home doing a shared activity.

The length of time spent on each section depends on the level of programme undertaken.

### Why do Bethany students participate so enthusiastically?

Good question!

It could be because from the first day to the last it's a real adventure. Every section is so different and there are so many new experiences to enjoy. The Scheme provides students with the opportunity to discover new talents and to face new challenges.

Achieving an Award gives students the skills, confidence and a view on life that everyone is looking for, from employers to colleges and universities. The Scheme provides recognition for doing things they want to do (and may even be doing already). Plus they can make a difference to other people's lives and to their community, be fitter and healthier, make new friends and have memories to last them a lifetime. And above all, it's a great fun!









### **EXPEDITIONS**



They spent one day climbing the north face of Tryffan and Gregory Lusted is pictured successfully undertaking the traditional, but perilous, step called "Adam and Eve". This group was exceptionally lucky with the weather which enabled them to make the climb. Tryffan was followed by a two day expedition on the Carnedd Range, including one overnight wild camp.

With Easter falling early they knew they were in for some mixed weather and this definitely turned out to be something of an understatement! Gale force winds and snow for much of the time made for some very challenging conditions and was certainly a test for all the kit!



Despite the weather everyone kept going and kept their sense of humour over the four day trip. Dana, our Gap student from Australia, was surprised at the amount of snow they experienced and the conditions certainly made for some interesting photos!



Here is an extract from one of the groups' diaries.





#### Day 1

After a five hour journey to the Peak District we set off on our expedition. Our walk took us over viaducts and around the Ladybower Reservoir in the Upper Derwent Valley. During World War II this is where 617 Squadron, "The Dambusters", practised their raids by releasing their "bouncing bombs" from a height of 60 feet at 222mph. We reached our campsite at around 6.00 pm, put up our tents and prepared our "boil in the bag" supper. It had been a sunny day and we had had a pleasant and picturesque start to our expedition.

#### Day 2

We awoke to rain and layered ourselves in our wet weather gear.

After an initial wrong turn, our walk that morning took us along a path called the "Roman Road". We walked for a long while along a ridge, rather too long as we had not spotted the footpath we should have taken. However, we were able to identify where we were from the map and eventually reached our checkpoint. The afternoon was rather eventful but despite minor disagreements over the route we finally reached our campsite, where half the groups were camping that night. We enjoyed our pasta supper but the cleaning up would have been easier if someone (you know who you are!) had remembered to put more water in the pan to cook the pasta!



#### Day 3

We were the last of the three groups to set off that day and our walk was quite straight forward. We pretty much followed the Pennine Way, passing through the campsite where the other two groups had camped overnight. We walked through farms and up to Jacob's Ladder, a rough stepped path up, what is said to be, one of the steepest ascents on the Pennine Way. Just when we thought we'd reached the top, another hill appeared. It was quite a mission but once we reached the top the view was breathtaking. Being a Sunday there were lots of walkers out and about.

We reached our checkpoint and discovered that for once one of the other groups (not us this time) had taken a wrong turn. From there we followed a sheep track and yes, we went wrong again. We re-set the compass and instead of retracing our steps completely decided to attempt a steep hill to get back on track.

When we reached our next checkpoint we were exhausted and were singing loudly (well the girls were) to keep our spirits up. After a much needed rest we headed off downhill and came to a ford. We decided to paddle and although the water was cold it was so refreshing. We reached the next

checkpoint without incident and carried on along a ridge with lovely views over the village of Edale. The campsite was only a short walk from here. We'd made it and celebrated with more pasta!

#### Day 4

An early start ready for the drive back to school.

The Peak District was so pretty and we had been quite lucky with the weather. It may not sound like it, but our group really did work well together. We were a small group and we had great fun together. It was an amazing experience!


After lunch the formal speeches took place in the Sports Hall. Thankfully there was to be no repeat of last year's drenching as the Sports Hall roof had finally been replaced! (Thank you Bursar!) The Chairman of Governors, Christopher Jackson, opened proceedings by outlining the School's plans and objectives for the coming years. He recognised all the staff for their huge efforts to ensure that Bethany is such a happy and effective school. Mr Jackson particularly thanked Mrs Gale, our Head of Science, Simon Douglass, the Bursar and Brian Chapman, the Estates Manager, for the amazing job they had done in setting up temporary science laboratories following the dramatic fire last summer and for all the work they had put into the planning of the new science centre, the most complex and costly project the School has ever undertaken.



The Headmaster reflected on what a pleasure and privilege it is for teachers to see young people grow and develop in the seven years they are in a secondary school such as Bethany. He offered a series of guidelines to teachers and parents to follow as they take young people through these vital years and try to nurture their self-confidence and selfesteem. He reminded the leavers that they had not become well-rounded and confident just because of the support and framework provided by the School but because they had committed themselves to the opportunities that had been made available to them. He went on to offer ten tips on surviving teenagers, encouraging the students to listen carefully so they could begin to understand what it can be like to be a parent or a teacher! Having thanked all the members of staff leaving Bethany at the end of the term he finished his speech on a similar vein to Mrs Vince's earlier in the day (a true coincidence we have been assured) by quoting Andre Maurois, the French author and man of letters who said: "Smile, for everyone lacks self confidence and more than any one thing a smile reassures them."

Our guest speaker, Mike Trueman, an experienced mountaineer, who has led many expeditions to the Himalayas and Mount Everest, presented this year's prizes before delivering his speech. He focussed on how quickly new opportunities in life are becoming available to the younger generation as advances in science and technology gain momentum. He pointed out that all students have skills which they may or may not have yet discovered, and with the increasing opportunities that are now available, many will be successful in ways that they may not have yet considered. He emphasised that schools have a responsibility to prepare young people to manage risk and congratulated Bethany for the wide range of activities such as the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme, and expeditions, which are made available to everyone in the School. He wished our leavers good fortune and hoped they would grasp exciting opportunities in the years ahead.

The Heads of School, Natasha Fitzgerald and Tom Hutchings gave the vote of thanks, after which parents, students, guests and Old Bethanians gathered for tea on the Headmaster's Lawn, before the leavers set off to prepare for the Leavers' Ball at High Rocks. It was a wonderful evening with many members of staff present with their partners. A memorable highlight of the evening was the raffle. Mr Simmons was overjoyed to win the final prize of the evening and there was much ribbing in the staff room when he returned to school after the weekend with his newly straightened hair!

which is being sent out to all members and there are plans to take the Society into the 'technological age' with the introduction of a new website and improved communication via e-mail.

It also has many events planned for the next year such as a Headmaster's dinner for Bethanian Society members in Hong Kong and a social event in Tunbridge Wells in November.

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
