ELCOME

As usual when I reflect on the past year, I am reminded of all of the good that has happened.

When I think of the autumn term I think of the wonderful pantomime by our Drama Scholars. I think of the excellent carol service and the warm and friendly music concerts. I am also reminded that my vocabulary has expanded, I found out the meaning of the word 'onesie', and I ended up wearing a giraffe onesie at our Prefects' Christmas Dinner!

In January we welcomed our Taiwanese visitors, who marvelled at how interactive lessons in an English school are, and they never cease to be amazed by the sight of an open fire. This is less surprising when one considers that most Taiwanese live in high rise apartments!

Our children continue to raise funds for many charities and our annual charity walk days have now become very much a part of Bethany life. We are very privileged to live in an environment which some call "The Bethany Bubble." I was therefore humbled when the Sixth Form approached me with their idea for a School day, which they called 'Poverty Day' in March. During the course of that day the School had no electricity or heat. Then, using a raffle ticket system, ten per cent of the pupils were allowed to have an English roast with all the trimmings, whilst the remaining ninety percent had to settle for soup and rice pudding and they sat on the floor. In excess of 1110kg of textiles were brought into School and then sent to a recycling scheme in exchange for funds. Toys were also donated to a Cambodian orphanage. The whole Bethany community became far more informed about world poverty as a result.

The Summer term started slowly but as the weather improved so did the frequency of our sports fixtures. We performed very well and there isn't a nicer place to be on this planet than our campus on a glorious summer's day.

The academic results were once again very encouraging and practically all our A-Level pupils are going on to their preferred choice of university, once again, there was a very high proportion of A^* - B grades.

Not to be outdone, our GCSE pupils achieved very good results and practically all of them are doing the A-Level subjects of their choice. I very often get asked by prospective parents what Bethany is good at. They often expect the standard answer such as: academic results, Art, Drama, Music, etc. I reply that our specialism is children, as it is only through knowing each child as an individual that one can properly recognise his or her strengths and areas that require further development. Whilst it's nice to be important it is more important to be nice. Bethany pupils are some of the nicest people I have had the privilege of meeting and working with, fostered by the ethos of the School and helped considerably by our parent body which is incredibly supportive.

I was delighted that we were able to substantially upgrade the facilities in the Orchard and Old Poplars, thus setting the standard to be rolled out to other houses. This year also saw our first pupils from Cambodia and Equatorial New Guinea arrive at Bethany and I hope that this will be the start of a long tradition.

If there was one single highlight then perhaps it has got to be Henry Olonga at Speech Day entertaining everyone with his excellent oratory. His message was potent and we all came away knowing that we owe it to ourselves and our families to make sure that we take the maximum advantage of the many opportunities that Bethany offers.

I would also like to pay particular thanks to the Board of Governors who give up their time voluntarily and support the School so well. The camaraderie and friendship that are so evident in our classrooms, our staff meetings and various pupil councils are also very obvious in all of the Board of Governor meetings.

I would like to thank you all most sincerely for your continued support of me personally which is a source of great strength and reassurance. There are many articles in this magazine which I hope you will enjoy reading. Finally I would like to thank our Marketing Manager, Mrs Clare Sender for co-ordinating this publication.





1st prize was awarded to the design team of Leo Rossouw and Jude Campbell with Jude as the driver. Their cart travelled a distance of 25.22m.




In 2nd place was Alex Monk, and out of the two runs his best was 25.14m.





Mathematics Challenge Competitions @

The following competitions are sponsored by either UKMT (United Kingdom Mathematics Trust) or FMSP (Further Maths Support Programme). All pupils in the top set in Years 7 - 11 take part in the individual challenges, plus all Sixth Form pupils currently studying Mathematics at AS or A2 level. The team competitions are open to any eligible pupil, but the standard in the competitions is very high, and sometimes an assessment round has to take place before we can decide on the final team of four to represent Bethany.

Summer Competition

If you can draw a 5-pointed star by drawing just 5 straight lines, you have drawn a Pentagram. This was the first task that Year 7 had to do in their Christmas Mathematics Competition. There were other tasks which included estimating the length of one minute and estimating the volume of one of Father Christmas' wellington boots. The runners up were Samuel Tate, Ben Stewart and Susan Warren. First place was awarded to Sebastian Greaves, who achieved well in all four tasks.

Year 8 9 **Easter Competition**

The Mathematics department challenged Year 8 to make an innovative box for a small Easter egg. They had to make a box which would hold an egg securely with the egg visible. Everyone who took part made a good attempt; the results were imaginative and many were very unusual. Prizes were awarded to Emilia Wyllie (3rd), Klyde Moradeyo (2nd) and Olly Chaplin (1st).



They had to build a free-standing tower using only 5 sheets of newspaper and 50cm of Sellotape, and it had to be capable of supporting a golf ball on the top for at least 10 seconds. This was a record breaking year; two teams managed to produce higher towers than ever seen before. The runners up, with a tower 2m 8cm high, were Oliver Craggs, Adam Wilkinson and Sam Butler. The winning tower, which almost stood from floor to ceiling, at a height of 2m 15cm, was created by Astrid Naughton, Rowan Beaumont and Mia Mallion. The Mathematics department would like to congratulate everyone who competed, which was most of Years 7, 8 and 9. The students all took part with great enthusiasm and demonstrated considerable skill. We shared some very entertaining

moments too!



UKMT Senior 🖋 Mathematics Challenge

Four Bethany mathematicians took part in the regional heat of the UK Mathematics Trust Senior Team Mathematics Challenge. Our team consisted of An Vu and Alexander Clayden-Spence (Year 13) and Jinsung Ha and Allen Imegwu (Year 12). The Bethany team worked very well together and overall we came 14th out of 34 very competitive and academic teams. We would like to encourage students to make up a team for next year as they will enjoy the competition and have a lot of fun.

Mrs Thorpe took a team of 4 pupils from Year 10 to The Judd School to take part in the Team Mathematics Challenge. This is the first time that Bethany has sent a team to compete in this relatively new Year 10 competition which saw 14 teams taking part mostly from local schools. There were 6 rounds, including a difficult round on the 'Absolute Value Function' which required special preparation, as it is a topic usually taught in the Upper Sixth. The team made a valiant attempt but unfortunately didn't win. Congratulations to Seav Meng Ing, Winston Mo, Elly Cheung and Jay Lee for taking part with such enthusiasm. They have all received certificates for participating.


Mrs Thorpe also took a team of 4 pupils from Year 8 and Year 9 to take part in the Team Mathematics Challenge in Tonbridge. It was very competitive with teams from almost 30 schools. There were 4 rounds, including a cross-number puzzle which required a great deal of strategy, a head to head relay which required careful planning and tested algebra skills, and a running relay. In this last round the teams had to run around handing in answers and collecting new questions as fast as possible. Congratulations for taking part and having lots of fun to Edward Simmonds, Will Smith, William Cunningham and Henry Beams who all received certificates.

Science

Two Year 8 pupils are embarking on an exciting project in partnership with SAPS (Science and Plants for Schools) which involves doing experiments on the cloning of carnivorous plants. Georgia Lello and Ella Dockery, have volunteered to conduct the initial trials. They have been using their lunchtimes to join our Senior Laboratory Technician, Mrs. Fillery, to dissect one of the larger carnivorous plants to see how many bugs they could find - the results were staggering! We hope the mini-project will prove to be a great success, which can then be expanded and extended over the next few years.

Of Chemistry Trip

4 students from Years 7 & 8: Lewis Baker, Rosa Davis, William Cunningham and Jessica Nicholls attended the Salters' Festival of Chemistry at University College London for a day of chemistry challenges, experiments and explosive demonstrations. Their main challenge was to solve a murder given only the smallest of clues and evidence, and for this task they were up against a large number of students from many other schools. They used their practical skills and abilities of deduction effectively to produce a forensic report, which was submitted to the judges. When the culprit, location and manner of the crime were revealed later in the day, our four pupils were disappointed to discover that, despite their wonderful enthusiasm and hard work, they didn't win the main prize. They were, however, awarded certificates for their success at the Festival and can be very proud of their teamwork and overall achievement on the day.





Goes Bang!

The National Science and Engineering Competition aims to recognise and reward young people's achievements in all areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). It is open to 11-18 year olds in the UK and provides young people with the opportunity to build their skills and confidence in project-based work. This is a perfect school activity for possible future inventors like Casper Round who took these photos using his unmanned aerial vehicle system.



Thousands of young people enter the Competition every year, either as a team or as an individual.

The best projects from across the UK are then invited to the National Finals, which are held in March each year at The Big Bang: UK Young Scientists & Engineers Fair. The finalists showcase their work to over 60,000 visitors and compete for a range of fantastic prizes worth over £50,000, including international experiences. Students spend approximately a year working on their projects that should be ready for submission by October 31st each year. All projects will be judged by judges from industry or education.

At Bethany we aim to submit all sorts of projects from all areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths. We are currently waiting to hear if Casper's amazing Hexacopter which has also been used in a film will win one of the prizes.

Curriculum Of Fun Morning

In Science another morning of fun experiments was held for pupils at primary school in Year 5. The aim is for them to experience Science lessons at secondary school level and, in particular, to enthuse them about Science at Bethany.

The theme for the morning was 'keeping healthy' and it included looking at heart rate and how exercise can affect it, as well as an investigation into what happens when someone has diabetes, including 'Tinkle Testing': testing for sugar in the (fake!) urine samples. The second half of the morning was dedicated to some of our department's favourite demonstrations such as elephant's toothpaste, the screaming jelly baby and the Mentos geyser.

Society Reborn!

From deep in the recesses of the Music School cupboards, and in the overworked mind of the slightly unhinged Director of Music, there stirred a strange, repeated E major chord. What could these four repeated sounds, followed by a short, sighing melody mean? Going deeper into the cupboard, he was attracted by a series of blue covered books in a row. Could he really hear the words "Comfort Ye" emanating from somewhere in the rack? What was this book? What did it all mean? He leaned closer to read the spine. At that moment, all the books shouted at once, with D Major brightness (yes, that's a musical fact; D major is a bright key) HALLELUJAH, HALLELUJAH! Of course, he had stumbled across the copies of Messiah first bought for the School in October 1977. Could these great books sing again? Not without the help of some singers! As luck would have it, Mr Stubberfield had recently made contact with Brenchley Choral Society, who had just become conductorless. It was at this point the great scheme was hatched; a combined performance of Handel's Messiah by both Bethany and Brenchley Choral societies.

Rehearsing with a small and dedicated group of students, along with the larger, very enthusiastic and more mature choir of Brenchley, gradually the great choruses came to life - "And the Glory of the Lord", "All We Like Sheep" and the golfer's carol "For! Unto Us A Child Is Born" all took off and engrained themselves into the singers' memories. Two performances were arranged. The first, the home leg, took place in the Function Suite, with the solos taken by our intrepid students venturing into new musical territory. Highlights included Patrick Cotter singing "Thou Shalt Break Them" and Jemima Harris the haunting yet valedictory "If God Be For Us". The small orchestra, arranged from local experienced players, supported our students with sensitivity and conviction. They were on hand again the following day to complete the away leg at Brenchley Church. Here, they were joined this time not only by both choirs, but also four professional soloists (including our very own Miss Johnson). Emily Bristow's instumental contribution playing "The Trumpet Shall Sound" on her newly acquired D trumpet was a highlight.

There were many great moments, but for the choir, the most transfixing was the final "Amen" chorus. Somehow, it sounded like Heaven in all its glory had touched Earth. This can only be achieved by quality musicians working together as a team. The joint venture will continue in 2014 with both Choral Societies combining in a performance of Rossini's Petite Messe Solennelle. The accompaniment will be supplied by Old Bethanian and Royal Academy student Timothy Ellis.

Finchcocks Revisited %

How appropriate that musicians should return to this amazing building, for herein lies the very root of the School's existence. Some 150 years ago, the owner of the House invited a certain J Kendon to help run a mission for hop pickers in the area. The rest, as they say, is history. On this occasion though we were returning not to proselytise, but to perform on the array of amazing instruments now housed in the building with the same fervor that our founder preached the gospel to surrounding villages.

There we met Steven Devine, who was giving a concert at Finchcocks that afternoon. He demonstrated several of the keyboards in the collection to us, from the earliest harpsichords, through the delicate and intimate sound of the clavichord.

to the beautifully toned fortepianos and their more robust cousin, the pianoforte. Armed with pieces from the English and European late Baroque and the classical Viennese School, our pianists immediately discovered the clarity that these instruments produce, making sense of the original music.

Many students had a favourite instrument, some preferring the small 'square' pianos, others the big sound of the later instruments. Mr Stubberfield, however, once prized away from the harpsichords, found a harmonium that was made shortly before Rossini's death. Perhaps he was getting an idea for 2014...

Barbican Visit

An intrepid group of musicians braved the intricacies of getting into the Barbican to hear a concert given by the London Symphony Orchestra in their resident hall. Before the concert, we were able to attend a discovery workshop with the LSO's resident animateur, Rachel Leach. Here we found out about Szymanowski's unique style, a combination of Debussy, Brahms, Liszt and Wagner all rolled into one. We had a chance to participate in playing sections of the piece with a member of the LSO, including Elly Cheung and Charlie Deane performing part of the main theme for the first symphony and Eden Fort conducting a section of the violin concerto. This prepared us for the cinematic and colourful world of Szymanowski's music.

For the concert itself, we had some of the best seats in the circle with both a great view of the orchestra and an ideal place to hear it at its most focussed. Indeed, at times during the Szymanowski, the orchestra seemed impossibly loud, bearing in mind they have no amplification. The sudden changes of mood and style in these pieces was emphasised by the crisp,







digital-quality acoustic of the hall. In the second half, the Brahms' symphony gave up all its secrets, with every tiny reference to Beethoven shining through in a crystal clear sound.

Orchestra Rocks On!

ELO had nothing on us this year, as our Orchestra demonstrated their versatility from Bach to Queen! Once again, they made a major contribution to the School Production, with excellent credentials as the 'We Will Rock You' backing group. The trumpets even found themselves suspended at great height above the stage – truly a unique experience. In solo role, as well as a great Christmas offering, their performances of "Singing in the Rain" and "String of Pearls" gave reference to the great tunes of the forties.

School Choir of

Miss Johnson took the helm again this year, and her popular choice of music included a stunning arrangement of "Umbrella," along with some great Christmas and Easter numbers. The Christmas Concert and Carol services were inspired with a spirited rendition of "Sheep, Sheep, Sheep" by all of Year 7, 8 and some of Senior Choir. Junior choir's acapella rendition of "Rose Red" showed the maturity of their younger voices. This certainly bodes well for the future of group singing in the School.

Jazz Band 🕉

The Jazz Band tackled three new A-level set works this year, which were challenging. Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington and Charlie Parker topped the bill in rehearsal time. The Jungle style of Ellington has been perfected through some excellent mute work in the trumpets and Winston Mo led the trombones out with a great growling sound! The Bebop influence on cool jazz number "Boplicity" even

stretched the very able William Scott to the limits of his saxophone style! In between this, the band managed to keep its standard repertoire ticking over well, extending improvisation skills through the standards. This year's rather blustery fête meant a last minute decamp into the Drama Theatre, rather than spending the morning chasing music across the School campus! With the roof open, they were still an active presence at this important event in the School year.

Other Ensembles

String Ensemble opted for quality rather than quantity. The results allowed all to shine with renewed technique, excellent projection and greater control of ensemble vibrato. This is largely due to Joseph Wolfe, our violin teacher, working hard to straighten bow holds. A new group for this year was the ALE - the A-Level Ensemble group. Their ability to turn their hand to a variety of compositions, from Claudia Lam's "The Peace of Three" to Alvin Lam's "Trumpets Just Gotta Have Fun," gave them an opportunity to express their developing instrumental skills and improve their composition marks all in one go. As ever, the Brass Ensemble was on hand to perform fanfares at the major civil and sacred events of the year, ably led by Amelia Brett, Emily Bristow and William Marshall. Further singing groups included several Steventon ensembles, with stunning harmony and projection. Several cello combos, under the inspirational guidance of Mr Chapter, also graced our concert evenings with a touch of class.

Instrumental Tuition %

It has been good to welcome Lianna Jeffery back to the instrumental staff, after a few years absence doing Cruise Ship tours. Our flute players have benefitted from her wide range of musical experiences and have moved

on to even greater performance work than before. Our other instrumental staff, as ever, have been helpful in preparing our musicians for such a diverse range of musical events. Particular thanks to concert regulars Katie Slowgrove, Jonathan Chapter and Emily Steventon. Our 'rhythm section' engine would not get going were it not for the patience, commitment and good humour of Andrew Keeping, Grant Tunbridge and Richmond Stockwell. Thanks also to Richard Fagg and Allan Ellingworth for their input and advice.

Musical Leavers

Several stalwart musicians have left this year and four are worth a special mention. Stephen Lee may only have been playing the piano for three years, but his rendition of the Chopin Fantasie-Etude was particularly stunning. His commitment to practising made evenings in the Music School a joy, listening to the detail and effort he put into his music. As he returns to Korea, we wish him well in his future studies. Eden Fort, whose piano and saxophone playing had been a regular feature of both Jazz Band and Assembly Band, has also gone to study overseas; her endless energy will also be missed greatly. Alexander Clayden-Spence has become a solid 'session style' drummer, demonstrating how a drummer can blend into a band so well. Young Interprise

This year for the first time ever Young Enterprise at Bethany reached new heights. Such was the number of students wishing to take part that three companies were formed: Vortex, Pink Ninjas and Switch.



The Young Enterprise programme, now in its 50th year, has seen thousands of students nationwide develop key skills that will enhance their employability and enterprise capabilities. Many alumni of the Company Programme have gone on to outstanding careers as entrepreneurs, corporate executives and public figures, and employers tend to look favorably on students who have taken part in the programme. This year took Bethany's total number of achievers since the scheme started to 338.

All three companies had a successful year, not only learning hands on how a business runs, but importantly making a profit! They returned dividends in excess of 20% to their shareholders, beating the stockmarket by a mile!

Switch provided supplies for events; their main product being ice creams that many parents will have bought. They also produced some excellent prototypes which unfortunately didn't quite get to production. Pink Ninjas were also events based, specialising in Mother's Day, Valentine's Day and running a tuck shop. Finally Vortex offered a personalised portrait service for students and events.

Young Enterprise Public Speaking

On Tuesday 29th January three Bethany pupils took part in the Young Enterprise Public Speaking Competition area heat. Each represented their Young Enterprise company. The three speakers were Fred Roberts (Vortex), Daanish Riaz (Pink Ninjas) and Henry Bonaert (Switch). Each spoke on the topic: "A brand is no longer what we tell the consumer it is. It is what consumers tell each other it is. How has social media and the internet affected customers and businesses?"

Congratulations to Daanish Riaz who was a very worthy winner. He spoke confidently and used many entertaining anecdotes. He went on to compete in the Kent County final, in February, at Tunbridge Wells Boy's Grammar School. There were six finalists, each having won their own area heat.

One neutral observer commented, "they were witty, original and delivered their pitch with panache. In fact they were one of the highlights of the evening." Whilst they were not the overall winners, the Pink Ninjas enjoyed a super evening and showed that Enterprise is thriving at Bethany.

TASK 2:



DUKE OF EDINBURGH'S AWARD



This year the numbers of students participating in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme were, 33 Year 10's embarking on their Bronze Award, 26 Year 11's continuing with their Silver Award and 31 pupils preparing for their Gold Award.

The electronic DofE system that participants use to record their progress through their chosen Award is now fully implemented and it is easier to monitor the progress of our students. Each participant has their own unique web page onto which they can upload evidence for each section of the Award and they can then see at a glance how they are doing. Examples of some activities they are currently involved in include: archery, bee keeping, cadets, clay pigeon shooting, climbing, cooking, dance appreciation, dog walking, embroidery, gardening and recycling.

Expeditions for the Bronze Award participants included a practice on the North Downs in freezing conditions, which resulted in the students pitching their tents inside a barn due to the weather conditions, and a much kinder qualifying expedition in the Surrey Hills.

The Silver Award candidates spent four reasonably sunny, but windy, days in Dorset for their practice, but the weather for their qualifying expedition in the Peak District in September was less accommodating, although it did improve for their final day. Despite this, they all successfully completed the expedition. The Gold Award is of course meant to be a challenge and it certainly was, with two practice expeditions to Snowdonia and the Lake District in weather conditions that provided a steep learning curve on mountain regions and the impact it can have on people and their kit.

We stayed in a friendly familyrun hotel in the heart of Ronda. I loved the food! On the fourth day we had chocolate con churros – yum.




different context which allowed her a special relationship with them.

The pupils will miss Alison's calm and considered approach, her systematic teaching and her ability to always see the funny side.



Bethany School was one of only 11 schools worldwide to have been awarded the coveted Geographical Association Centre of Excellence status. These hubs of excellence are pivotal to the Geographical Association's desire to spread good practice through the development of local networks of teachers. The Centre of Excellence award recognises the contribution of schools in disseminating quality approaches to the teaching of Geography. In these schools geography is led by enthusiastic curriculum leaders who are able to inspire their colleagues and pupils alike.

All the award winners undergo a rigorous moderation process, and the team of assessors were hugely impressed by the manner in which Bethany School is embracing the new opportunities afforded by the curriculum changes at Key Stage 3. This award, now into its fifth year, reflects the national standard for the teaching of quality geography. It aims to promote effective subject leadership and management so helping subject leaders raise the standards of geography in their schools.

Mr Healy said, "How I wish this Geography department existed when I was a teenager, well done to all involved".






